1. CALL TO ORDER:

A regular meeting of the Santa Clara Valley Water District (Valley Water) Water Supply and Demand Management Committee (Committee) was called to order by Chairperson Hsueh at 12:00 p.m. in the Valley Water Headquarters Building Boardroom at 5700 Almaden Expressway, San Jose, California, and by Zoom teleconference.

1.1. Roll Call.

Committee members in attendance were: District 5 Director Nai Hsueh, Chairperson, District 2 Director Shiloh Ballard, Vice Chairperson, and District 3 Director Richard Santos, constituting a quorum of the Committee.

Chairperson Hsueh declared time open for public comment on any item not on the agenda. There was no one who wished to speak.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

3.1 Approval of October 27, 2025 Water Supply and Demand Management Committee (WSDMC) Minutes.

The Committee considered the minutes of the October 27, 2025 Water Supply and Demand Management Committee (WSDMC) meeting.

It was moved by Vice Chairperson Ballard, seconded by Director Santos, and unanimously carried, that the minutes be approved as presented.

Recommendation: Receive an update on the groundwater basins managed by Valley Water and compliance with the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act.

Jason Gurdak reviewed the information on this item, per the attached Committee Agenda Memo and in the attachment and was available to answer questions.

The Committee discussed the following with staff input including: the Valley Water Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) that will be submitted to the Department of Water Resources (DWR) in 2026, relating to the Santa Clara and Llagas subbasins in Santa Clara County, managed exclusively by Valley Water, and the North San Benito Subbasin in Santa Clara and San Benito counties, primarily managed by San Benito County Water District. Staff noted at least several public meetings with opportunity for input will be held before the final plan is submitted to the DWR.

Public Comment: None.

The Committee received the information and took no formal action.

4.2 Receive an Update on Valley Water’s South County Managed Aquifer Recharge Activities.

Recommendation: Receive an update on Valley Water’s South County managed aquifer recharge activities.

Bassam Kassab reviewed the information on this item, per the attached Committee Agenda Memo and in the attachments and was available to answer questions.

Staff presented four potential South County Recharge Projects that are being studied per the 2025 Water Supply Master Plan: 1. San Pedro Ponds Improvement, 2. Coyote Valley Recharge Pond, 3. Madrone Channel Expansion, 4. Butterfield Channel Managed Aquifer Recharge

The Committee received the information and requested that Valley Water’s representative on the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO), Director Beall, discuss sewer implementation in South County at LAFCO, as the

primary challenge with San Pedro Ponds Project is due to the nearby septic systems interfering with operating the San Pedro Ponds at full capacity.

Public Comment: Doug Muirhead.

The Committee received the information and took no formal action.

4.3 Receive and Discuss Information Regarding the Semitropic Groundwater Storage Bank.

Recommendation: Receive and Discuss information regarding the Semitropic Groundwater Storage Bank.

Kaho Kong reviewed the information on this item, per the attached Committee Agenda Memo and in the attachment and was available to answer questions.

The Committee discussed the following with staff input including: the water quality of groundwater in the Kern County Subbasin and Department of Water Resources (DWR) timelines relating to the review of the Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSPs). Further discussion ensued relating to staff efforts on other out-of-county groundwater banking opportunities.

Staff noted once the Subbasin is returned to DWR oversight, DWR will review the final 2025 Subbasin GSPs, including the final Semitropic GSP. Staff stated they will continue to review potential impacts to banking operations as SGMA is implemented, in addition to other factors that may impact Semitropic operations, such as water quality.

Public Comment: Doug Muirhead and Arthur Keller.

The Committee received the information and took no formal action.

4.4 Review and Discuss Water Supply and Demand Committee (WSDMC) Work Plan and Upcoming Discussion Items.

Recommendation: Review and discuss the WSDMC Work Plan and upcoming discussion items.

Staff noted one item for the January 26, 2026 WSDMC meeting, the Urban Water Management Plan but that it was not critical to be in January and could be moved.

SUBJECT:

Receive Information on 2025 Urban Water Management Plan Update and Provide Feedback.

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive information on 2025 Urban Water Management Plan update; Provide Feedback to Staff.

SUMMARY:

The Santa Clara Valley Water District (Valley Water), as a wholesale urban water supplier, is required by California Water Code §10610-10656 to update its Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP) every five years. Valley Water's UWMP documents important information on water supply, water usage, water supply reliability, water conservation programs, and water shortage contingency planning in Santa Clara County. It provides an overall picture of Valley Water's current and future water conditions and management over the next 25 years and complements other water resource planning efforts.

Valley Water last updated its UWMP in 2021 and is currently developing the 2025 UWMP in accordance with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) guidelines. This memorandum summarizes key requirements of the UWMP and Valley Water's timeline for completion. The 2025 UWMP must be adopted following a public hearing and submitted to DWR by July 1, 2026.

Demand Projections

The UWMP must include current and projected water use in five-year increments for a period of at least 20 years. Valley Water recently completed its Water Supply Master Plan (WSMP) 2050 with two demand projections. Valley Water plans to use the WSMP demand projections for developing its 2025 UWMP.

Water Supply Reliability Analysis

The UWMP will also identify and quantify the existing and planned sources of water available to Valley Water for the next 25 years to meet the projected countywide demand. The plan requires water supply reliability analysis under normal, a single dry year, and five consecutive dry year

conditions through 2045. In addition to this analysis, a drought risk analysis is also required for a five-year drought that is assumed to occur in the next five years and represents the worst drought in an agency's service area.

Valley Water is planning to use the WSMP 2050 analysis and recommended projects as the basis for future supply estimation. For the five-year drought risk analysis, Valley Water will use information on historical droughts and actions in the most recent drought to conduct the analysis.

Water Shortage Contingency Plan

As part of the UWMP update, Valley Water will also update its Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP), now a separate and standalone plan, to establish actions and procedures to address water shortages due to droughts and other emergencies. Following DWR requirements, the WSCP also summarizes other planning efforts related to natural disasters, drought revenue impacts, as well as Valley Water's legal authority and communication protocol to respond to water shortages.

Demand Management Measures

In recognizing the importance of demand management to sustainable management of water resources in California, the UWMP requires urban suppliers to present their efforts to promote water conservation and reduce water demands. Valley Water's demand management measures include metering, public education and outreach, rebates for residential and commercial users, including rebates for lawn conversion, free water use audits and consultation, and many more. The 2025 UWMP will summarize conservation efforts over the past five years, as well as Valley Water's conservation goals and water savings.

Reduced Reliance on the Delta

Starting from the last UWMP update, DWR requires the suppliers receiving or planning to receive water from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (Delta) to demonstrate their reduced reliance on the Delta. Valley Water receives Delta water from the State Water Project, Central Valley Project, and water transfers and exchanges. Therefore, Valley Water falls under this requirement. Valley Water, with the support of all its retailers, has made significant investments in demand management and local supplies to increase regional self-reliance and reduce the county's reliance on the Delta. These investments include conservation and demand management; recycled and purified water; seismic retrofits of local reservoirs; and regional collaborations. With these past efforts and planned investments and water conservation goals recommended in the WSMP 2050, Valley Water will be able to fulfill this requirement.

Coordination and Outreach

Valley Water is coordinating with retailers on data and information sharing and will provide retailers with the draft UWMP and WSCP for review. For regional collaboration on updating the UWMP, Valley Water has notified all cities within Santa Clara County, the County, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, and the Bay Area Water Conservation and Supply Agency of its efforts. The draft plans will be posted on the Valley Water website for public review, and a public hearing will be held for plan adoption.

Timeline and Next Steps

Below is the timeline for Valley Water's 2025 UWMP development:

- November - December 2025: reviewed DWR's draft guidebook, identified data requirements, developed analysis methodologies, and coordinated with internal stakeholders
- December 2025 - February 2026: engage and coordinate with external stakeholders on data and information sharing
- March - April 2026 - Draft plan review
- May 2026: Public review of draft plan
- June 2026: Public hearing for plan adoption

Valley Water will bring another update to this committee before the public hearing. Staff will also continue to coordinate with water retailers on demand projections, water supplies, and reduced Delta reliance, to support each agency's UWMP development.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE IMPACT:

The Urban Water Management Plan addresses water supply equity by ensuring a cost-effective, high-quality supply is available for all of Santa Clara County, including disadvantaged communities.

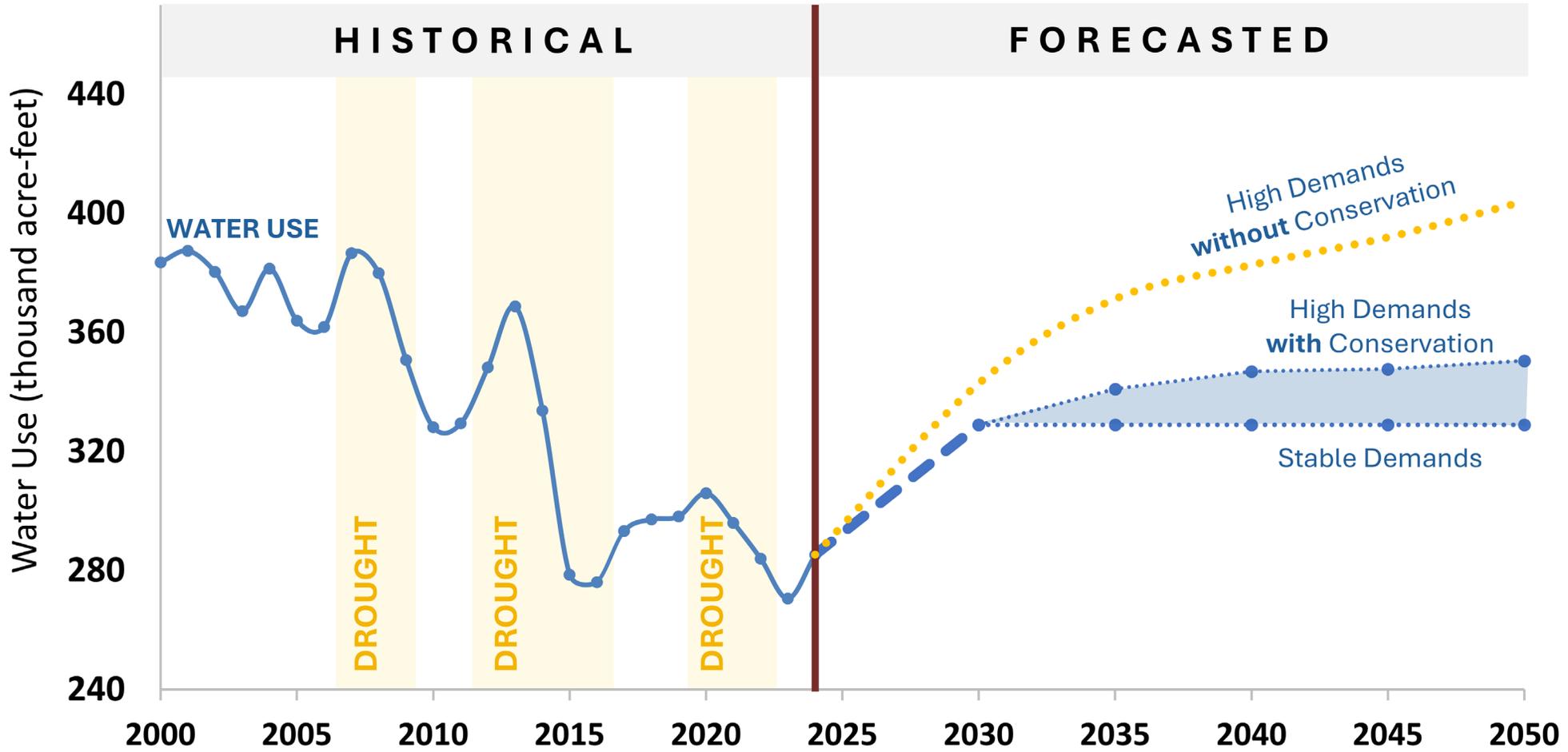

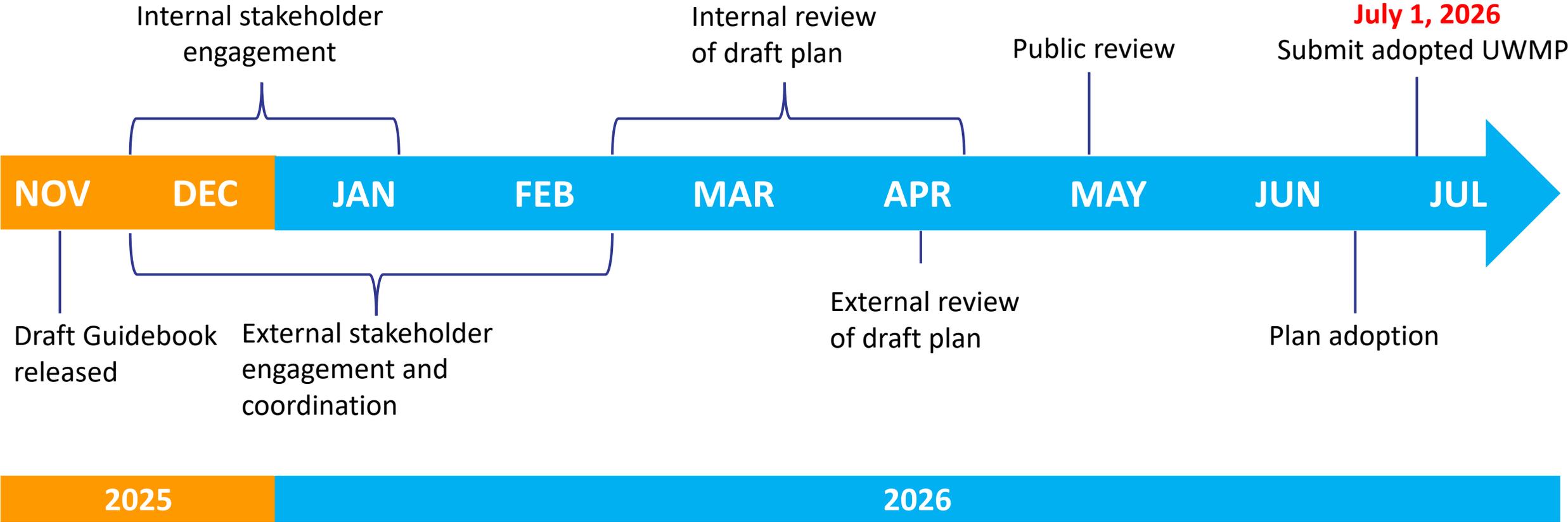

SUBJECT:

Receive Update on Groundwater Basins Managed by Valley Water and Compliance with the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act.

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive an update on the groundwater basins managed by Valley Water and compliance with the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act.

SUMMARY:

The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires that groundwater sustainability agencies (GSAs) managing a basin ranked as medium- or high-priority submit a groundwater sustainability plan (GSPs) or prescribed Alternative to a GSP (Alternative) to the Department of Water Resources (DWR) by a certain statutory deadline. Valley Water met this deadline and has a DWR approved Alternative for the high-priority Santa Clara and Llagas subbasins. Additionally, Valley Water serves as a GSA with San Benito County Water District (SBCWD) for the medium-priority North San Benito Subbasin.

Valley Water staff last updated the Water Supply and Demand Management Committee (Committee) on December 8, 2025 with a schedule for the required periodic evaluation of the Alternative that is due to DWR by December 17, 2026. This Committee update includes the progress and outreach plan for the periodic evaluation of the Alternative for the Santa Clara and Llagas subbasins and an update for the North San Benito Subbasin. Under SGMA, periodic evaluations are required at least once every five years.

Santa Clara and Llagas Subbasins

Staff are conducting technical analyses needed to update information on basin conditions and incorporating DWR recommended actions into the periodic evaluation of the Alternative. The recommended actions listed below are designed to facilitate DWR evaluation and improve implementation of the Alternative.

1. Explain how inter-basin items have been coordinated.
2. Ensure monitoring network details are consistent with DWR's SGMA Portal Monitoring

Network Module.

As work on the Alternative progresses, staff will update the Committee and engage interested parties through outreach, including email updates, social media posts, and public meetings. A public review of the draft updated Alternative is expected to be available in late summer/early fall 2026 to solicit public input prior to consideration by Valley Water Board of Directors in late fall 2026.

North San Benito Subbasin

Valley Water shares GSA responsibilities with SBCWD for the North San Benito Subbasin, which is primarily located in San Benito County. The periodic evaluation of the DWR approved GSP is being led by SBCWD, including all technical analyses. Valley Water staff are supporting the evaluation and update by serving on the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). The first TAC meeting was held at the SBCWD on January 13, 2026.

As work on the GSP progresses, staff will update the Committee and engage interested parties. A public review of the draft updated GSP for the North San Benito Subbasin is expected to be available in early fall 2026 to solicit public input prior to consideration by both the SBCWD and Valley Water Board of Directors in fall 2026.
