CREEK STEWARDSHIP

In support of the 32nd Annual National River Cleanup Day, Valley Water, in partnership with the Creek Connections Action Group, coordinated another successful cleanup event in Santa Clara County on Saturday, May 18. This year, there were 42 cleanup sites throughout all seven Valley Water districts. Around 700 volunteers cleaned 66 miles of creeks, shorelines, and natural areas, removing approximately 17,255 pounds of litter. Volunteers found some interesting items including a water heater tank, an iPhone, a wheelchair, and a beach ball. In addition to National River Cleanup Day, four of Valley Water's Adopt-A-Creek volunteers organized separate cleanup events throughout May in districts four, six, and seven.

EDUCATION OUTREACH

In May, the Education Outreach team reached districts one, three, five, six, and seven through virtual and in-person classroom lessons and public events. Middle school students learned about the interaction between natural and humanconstructed water cycles, and elementary students explored concepts of water conservation and pollution prevention.

WATER 101 ACADEMY

The Water 101 Academy held its third and fourth virtual sessions in May. The session topics were Watershed Works in Action and Water is Life: Securing Our Future.

WATER SUPPLY OUTREACH

In May, Water Supply Outreach (WSO) hosted nine tours of the Silicon Valley Advanced Water Purification Center (Purification Center) and engaged 180 people from the community, including the Silicon Valley Leadership Group, San José Conservation Corps and Ellen Fletcher Middle School. On May 10, WSO staff supported the Recycled and Purified Water team in organizing the Direct Potable Reuse Workshop at Valley Water headquarters. For the workshop, staff coordinated a presentation with Dr. Steven Jackson, Chair of the Environmental Health Committee with the Santa Clara County Medical Association. Dr. Jackson shared the committee's support for adding purified water to Santa Clara County's drinking water supply and the importance of medical professionals supporting potable reuse. WSO staff presented an overview of Valley Water's public outreach efforts. The workshop attendees included doctors, engineers, local city staff and consultants.

COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM

On May 29, Community Rating System (CRS) program staff hosted the final fiscal year 2024 meeting for the CRS Users Group and Program for Public Information Committee, with approximately 15 staff representing 11 local communities. Participants discussed the Flood Awareness Campaign, outreach to residents in the Special Flood Hazard Area, and updates for the Multi-Jurisdictional Program for Public Information Annual Evaluation Report.

SAFE, CLEAN WATER GRANTS AND PARTNERSHIPS

On May 2 and 21, Grants staff hosted virtual workshops for the Mini-Grant and Refill Station Grant Programs. Twenty attendees received information about year-round funding opportunities and useful tips for successfully completing a minigrant application. Refill Station Grants

In FY 2024, Franklin-McKinley School District used its \$5,000 refill station grant to fund a new water bottle refill station at Stonegate Elementary School in San José. The refill station serves over 600 students and promotes the use of reusable water bottles among students, staff, and visitors.

Standard Grants

On May 11, Valley Water Grants, Communications, and Education Outreach staff attended Saved By Nature's Headwaters to the Bay: Lake Almaden and Valley Water Headquarters (HQ) Hike event, partially funded by an \$84,001 Safe, Clean Water F9 Standard Grant. Thirteen participants began the day at Valley Water HQ, hiked around the Los Alamitos Percolation Pond and Almaden Lake Park, and then headed back to HQ. The event included opening

remarks from Director Beall and an educational Enviroscape demonstration hosted by Valley Water's Education Outreach program. A videographer helped document the day and interview the grantee staff about the event and their grant.
