Staff to provide an estimate of the portion of the costs to expedite the Oroville Dam spillway repairs that may be passed along to the State Water Contractors and what portion of that cost would be the responsibility of the District I-17-0006

This is a response to the April 6, 2017, request that staff provide an estimate of costs for the repairs to the Oroville Dam spillway that may be the responsibility of State Water Project contractors, and what could be the water district's obligation.

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) received three bids, ranging from \$275 million to \$344 million, to implement DWR's Oroville Spillway Recovery Plan by November 1, 2017, so as to safely accommodate next year's winter weather. On April 17, 2017, DWR awarded a \$275 million contract to Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. and issued the notice to begin work. It is anticipated that the repairs necessary for a long-term solution will be accomplished in phases over multiple years. DWR is still developing these plans and has yet to publish an estimate of total repair costs.

On April 2, 2017, President Trump announced that \$274 million of federal assistance would be made available for repairs to the Oroville Dam spillway through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). These funds, when received by DWR, are expected to be used for costs related to DWR's emergency response actions prior to initiating the Oroville Spillway Recovery Plan. DWR is continuing to seek disaster relief from FEMA and other sources.

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DWR has yet to determine the total cost of repairs or what cost share, if any, would be borne by public water agencies that contract with the State Water Project. Staff anticipates that the water district's share of any such costs would be approximately 2.5 percent of the total State Water Project obligation, consistent with the water district's proportional contractual share in the project.
